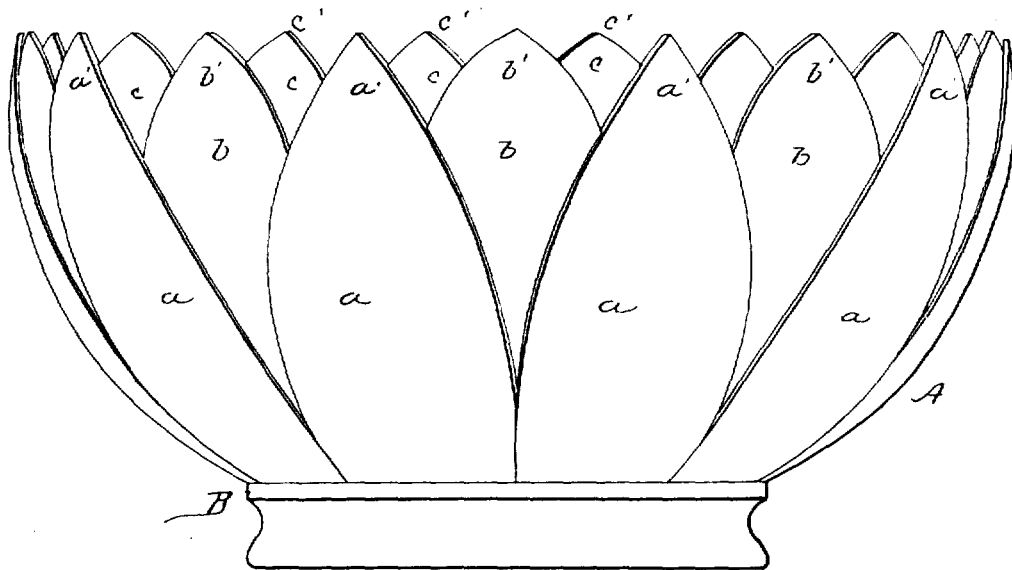

DESIGN FOR A LAMP GLOBE OR SHADE.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 21,819, dated August 30, 1892.

Application filed August 1, 1892. Serial No. 441,878. Term of patent 7 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOSEPH WEBB, a subject of the Queen of Great Britain, and having declared my intention of becoming a citizen of the United States, residing at Sewickley, in the county of Allegheny and State of Pennsylvania, have invented a certain new and useful Design for Globes and Shades; and I do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same.

This invention relates to designs for hollow articles of glassware, such as globes and shades for gas or electric lights.

The design which constitutes my invention is particularly applicable to globes or shades of substantially hemispheric form; and it consists of a series of raised figures of a shape similar to that of tulip-leaves, with their bases or wide ends in close proximity and with their points spreading apart at the edge of the globe or shade, these figures apparently overlapping others of similar form, the points of the second series of figures being midway between the points of the first series of figures, and the second series of figures apparently overlapping a third series of figures of similar form, the points of the third series of figures being midway between the points of the first and second series of figures, the whole design being intended to represent and pre-

senting to the eye the appearance of a partially-opened tulip-flower.

The accompanying drawing is a side view of a globe or shade embodying my design.

The body of the globe or shade (designated by the letter A) is of substantially hemispheric form and bears on its outer surface a series of figures *a a a*, of a form similar to that of the leaves of a tulip-flower and with their bases in proximity at the neck B of the globe or shade. The figures *a a a* have their points *a' a'* spread apart at the edge of the globe or shade, and these figures apparently overlap a second series of figures of similar form *b b b*, the points *b' b' b'* of which are also spread apart and are midway between the points *a' a' a'* of the figures *a a a*. A third series of figures, similar in form to the figures *a* and *b* and apparently overlapped by both, is lettered *c c c*, and their points *c' c' c'* project midway between the points *b'* of the figures *b* and the points *a'* of the figures *a*.

Having described my design, I claim—

The design for a globe or shade, substantially as herein shown and described.
